A summary of the mammals of Fish Springs National Wildlife Refuge for the summer of 1958.

Keith Hansen, Student Assist. Sept. 26, **3**958 The following is a summary of mammals observed at Fish Springs National Wildlife Refuge, Juab Co., Utah. These observations were made during the periods of June 29, thru July 3, July 14-18, and July 21-25, 1958. Observations were made in connection with work of cover type mapping, brood and nesting counts, and a preliminary survey of the area.

The refuge consists mainly of flooded alkali flats, and lies just east of the Fish Springs range, with foothills of the range entering the refuge in a place or two near the north end. The refuge is fed by numerous cold springs located al-

ong the western edge of the area.

Very few mammals were observed on the refuge during the period mentioned above. The most common being the Muskrat, Ondatra zibethica, which appear to be very numerous, having tunneled through most of the small dikes that are now on the area. Two other rodents seen on the area were the field mouse, and the meadow mouse, although neither of these appeared to be overly abundant. Both the Black-tailed Jackrabbit, Lepus californicus, and the Cottontail, Sylvilagus nuttalli, were observed, but not in great numbers. Antelope Ground Squirrels, Citellus leucurus, were abundant on the higher areas, usually in the Shadscale-Rabbitbrush complex. Two types of bats were observed on the area, but only one was positively identified, that being the Small-footed Myotis, Myotis subulatus. The larger species was in all probably being the Brown Bat, Eptesicus fuscus. One Badger, Taxidea taxus, were observed near the old Pony Express Station, and a dark color phase of the red fox, Vulpes fulva, was seen about 15 miles east of the refuge; it is possible that it may frequent the refuge on occasion. Coyote, Canis latrans, tracks were seen inside the refuge boundry, but no coyotes were observed inside the refuge boundry during the periods mentioned. Remains of the Spotted Skunk, Spilogale interrupta, Badger, Bobcat, and Coyote wer present around the old trappers cabin near the North Spring, but being unable to contact the trapper it is not certain if these animals not already mentioned were taken on the refuge or not.

Mr. Jack Kelp, a student at Wash. State Univ. who is working on his masters degree in Geology on the Fish Springs range reported that he and seen Antelope, Antilocapra americana, on the area. He suggested that additional information on mammals utilizing the area might be obtained by contacting the Ecological Section at Dugway Proving Grounds. This I was unable to do in the time alloted for work at Fish Springs, but much valuable information might be gained from this source for future use in compiling a complete and accurate list of mammals on the area.

This meager information is respectfully submitted with the hope that it will be of some use in future work on the Fish Springs Refuge.
