



Dear Eric and Beth Thomas:

Thank you for your letter expressing your concerns about the proposed Cross Kenai Trail.

The proposal to link the trail system northeast of the Moose Range boundary to a trail in the Fox River drainage has existed for many years. Planning to date has not progressed beyond the concept stage as it affects the Kenai National Moose Range.

The legislation establishing the Moose Range mandates management for wildlife and their habitats and provides for wildlife related recreation when these activities do not interfere with the main purpose of the Range.

A series of trails along the eastern side of the Moose Range has existed for many years and although use has been relatively light a number of parties use the trails each year. Our intention would be to consolidate a route of the existing trails which would lead a hiker along the eastern side of the Moose Range. We do not envision a new system of constructed trails. Currently we are considering a route marked with cairns and posts placed at sight distance intervals which would keep a hiker on track through the areas where the route may be confusing. As the area under disucssion is in a proposed wilderness area and is a research natural area, all motorized travel is prohibited.

The type of user interested in this kind of a trail system would be limited to wilderness oriented persons. Because of budget and management constraints we do not plan to make many improvements along the route. At this time we have not solved the problems concerning the crossings at the Skilak and Tustumena glacier outflows. Many other rivers along the route also present crossing problems which we do not have solutions for. Due to the fragile nature of the alpine tundra we do not support the idea of establishing a standard trail which leads to erosion and alterations of the water table and wildlife movements. In short, we envision establishing a way that one could cross the eastern side of the Moose Range while at the same time enjoy a challenge that would eliminate the motorized traveler or the casual hiker.

We appreciate your concerns and would welcome the opportunity to talk to you in person if you find yourself in Anchorage.
