that transmitter was in a sauger in the yellowstone river before it became pelican food and ended up at medicine lake. it was implanted april 6, 2002 near miles city and last located at its "home location" june 27, 2003 about 20 miles upstream of miles city. we tracked that fish over two complete spawning seasons and observed annual round trip movements of about 150 miles to spawning areas near fallon.

thanks for turning in the tag info beth! this explains some of the mysterious disappearances of transmitters from our study area.
