## CLARENCE CANNON NWR

#### Annual Trapping Assessment

Beaver and muskrat populations have reached a level where they are interfering with refuge operations. Beaver have plugged water control structures and ditches, and muskrats have damaged dikes. Many hours have been spent clearing control structures, especially at Hemphill Crossing.

A ground count conducted last year showed 21 muskrat houses on Big Pond. Population levels for the refuge are estimated at 500 muskrat and 25 beaver. An aerial survey is planned for FY 1991.

Last year's trapper successfully harvested eight beaver and nine muskrats from the Hemphill Crossing area.

# Trapping Proposal

Trapping of beaver and muskrat will be conducted in FY 91 if deemed necessary by the refuge manager. Mr. Bob Wilson, last year's trapper, will be selected this year to harvest beaver and muskrat. If he chooses not to trap again, an announcement and application process will be conducted for selecting another trapper.

Trapping areas, regulations, equipment, and seasons are outlined below and in the Appendix. Trapping will be conducted in accordance with the Missouri State regulations and seasons and special permit conditions.

Trapping will cease after quotas are reached or at the discretion of the Refuge Manager. Quotas and seasons are as follows:

Beaver	December 1 - March 31	20 animals
Muskrats	December 1 - January 5	80 animals

The trapping season will begin after the waterfowl hunting season so that disturbance to waterfowl is lessened. By the time trapping begins in December, waterfowl populations will have already peaked.

Trapping operations should not disturb or endanger wintering bald eagles. Should disturbance occur, the trapping permit will be cancelled. Special conditions of the permit requiring covered traps and prohibiting the use of bait will ensure that eagles and other raptors do not come into contact with traps.

#### Administrative Costs

Costs associated with the program will be conducting the application process if needed and inspecting the trap line. This is estimated at 16 staff-hours at a cost of \$250.

#### FUR TRAPPER NEEDED

ANNADA, MISSOURI - The Mark Twain National Wildlife Refuge, Annada District, is currently accepting applications to trap beaver and muskrat on a portion of the 3,700-acre Clarence Cannon National Wildlife Refuge this season. One trapper will be allowed to harvest up to 20 beaver and 80 muskrats in designated areas of the refuge. Dates of trapping will be from December 1 to March 31 for beaver and from December 1 to January 5 for muskrats. The trapping will be conducted in accordance with both Missouri State regulations and special refuge permit conditions.

The trapping program has been initiated in order to control the population levels of beaver and muskrat on the refuge. Without this control, these animals cause damage to the interior dikes and water control systems that are essential for maintaining quality habitat for waterfowl and other wildlife.

Interested persons must complete a trapping permit application. To obtain an application and an information packet, call or visit the refuge headquarters one mile east of Annada. Office hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Refuge staff are not always in the office, so it is best to call ahead before visiting. The refuge phone number is 314/847-2333.

Applications will be accepted from now until the close of business on November 16th.

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Pursuant to the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Title 50, Section 31.16, the following conditions apply to the trapping of furbearing animals on National Wildlife Refuges.

1. State and Federal requirements - Trapping will be done in compliance with State game laws and regulations, and may be further restricted by general and special conditions of the Refuge Trapping Permit. Permittees will also comply with all other regulations and conditions affecting access to and use of the National Wildlife Refuges.

2. <u>Trapping permits</u> - Any person exercising the privilege of trapping furbearing animals within National Wildlife Refuge boundaries must possess a valid State trapping license and a Refuge Trapping Permit issued by the refuge manager. Trappers will carry such State trapping license and Refuge Trapping Permit while trapping, and when requested to do so, will exhibit them to any Federal or State agent authorized to enforce the game and fish laws of the State or of the United States. Permits are not transferable.

The refuge manager may at any time, before or during the trapping season, halt or limit trapping on the refuge or any portion thereof. Conditions of the permit may be modified as needed. Any changes will be made by an addendum (signed by both the issuing officer and the permitee) which should be attached to, and becomes a part of, the permit.

3. Approved traps, trap inspection and removal -Furbearing animals authorized to be taken on the refuge may be taken only by methods approved by both the State and the refuge manager.

Trap types, sizes, sets, baits, scents and locations will be selected to minimize the taking of non-target species.

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All leghold traps with jaw spread greater than 5 1/2 inches will be of the "off-set-jaw" type (jaws with an opening of not less than 3/16" when closed). Steel leghold traps having teeth, spiked, or serrated jaws, (either attached or as part of the trap) are prohibited. Conibear traps size 330 or larger are prohibited for land use. Use in water sets for beaver or otter is acceptable unless prohibited by State regulation or a refuge trapping condition.

In order to reduce the accidental trapping of birds of prey, the use of sight-exposed bait is prohibited. - Sight-exposed bait means any visible animal part or facsimile thereof, (excluding dry skeletal items from which the skin, hair, feathers and flesh have been removed) used to visually attract an animal to a trap or traps.

The possession or use within the boundaries of the refuge of any trap or captive device that does not comply with State and refuge requirements is prohibited. Any such illegal traps or devices found on the refuge may be seized and retained by the refuge manager.

Permittees are required to visit and inspect each trap set at least once every 24 hours, unless specifically waived by the refuge manager.

Inspection shall occur between one-half hour before sunrise and one-half hour after sunset, unless otherwise specified by State or refuge permit provisions. At the close of the trapping season, the permittee shall remove all traps and equipment from the refuge. This will be done within a time frame designated by the refuge manager.

4. Use of vegetation - The permittee may cut on the refuge for use in trap sets only such species and amounts of brush or timber as the refuge manager shall designate.

5. Tending another person's traps - No person may attend another person's traps or trap line unless specifically authorized by the refuge manager.

6. Non-target species - Every effort will be made to prevent the capture of non-target species. However, if an unauthorized animal is found alive and in satisfactory condition in a trap, it shall be immediately released. Animals found dead or seriously injured in the traps shall be disposed of as desginated by the refuge manager.

7. <u>Reports - Permittees shall submit a report (or</u> reports) of traptake, of both target and non-target species, as required by refuge special conditions. The capture of all non-target species, regardless of condition, will be reported. (The permittee will not be prosecuted for accidental take which he or she reports.) Trappers should also promptly report the presence of diseased animals to the refuge manager.

If the refuge trapping conditions permit the mailing of trap-take reports, such reports must be sent by certified mail with the permittee retaining the signed receipt as proof of submission.

8. <u>Penalties</u> - Failure of a permittee to comply with any of the trapping provisions or with any applicable Federal or State law or regulation may be sufficient cause for refusal of any other use or privilege on the refuge for which a permit may be required.

The permit may be revoked or suspended by the issuing officer for just cause, such as violation, non-compliance with permit conditions, or nonuse (50 CFR 25.43).

Permittees who wish to appeal adverse decisions should follow the appeals procedures designated in 50 CFR 25.44.

9. Damages - The United States shall not be responsible for any loss or damage to property, including but not limited to, animals and equipment; for injury to the permittee, partner(s) or assistant(s); or for damages or interference caused by wildlife or employees or representatives of the Government carrying out their official responsibilities.

## SPECIAL PERMIT CONDITIONS

- 1. Trapping hours will be from sunrise to sunset daily.
- 2. Permittee is required to report all animals taken to the Refuge Manager on a regular basis, not to exceed one week intervals.
- 3. Trapping activities will cease immediately after quotas are reached or at the discretion of the Refuge Manager.
- 4. Permittee will access and inspect traps once every 24 hours and with minimal disruption to other wildlife species, particularly waterfowl and eagles.
- 5. Permittee will trap only in the area designated by the Refuge Manager. Trespass into the critical bald eagle zone WILL RESULT IN IMMEDIATE REVOCATION OF THE TRAPPING PERMIT AND A CITATION.
- 6. In order to protect raptors from accidental trapping, sets shall be placed under cover of existing or constructed natural materials not higher than 36" above the set. Cover constructed from natural materials shall consist of a tripod of three wood poles at least onehalf inch in diameter placed over the trap. No bait of any kind may be used.
- 7. The use of boats is authorized only with permission from the Refuge Manager.
- 8. Permittee must have in his/her possession the Refuge Trapping Permit and applicable State licenses/permits while on the refuge.
- 9. Permittee will keep the Refuge Manager informed of the location of all trap sets and will provide a list of trap types and sizes he/she intends to use.
- 10. Permittee will park vehicles so as not to block refuge roads.
- 11. Trapping area is closed to the general public, therefore, permittee must limit activities in the trapping area to those associated with the trapping operation.
- 12. Permittee will follow all refuge regulations, such as:

No alcoholic beverages are permitted on refuge property No firearms are permitted on refuge property Speed limit is 25 m.p.h. unless otherwise posted

- 13. Permittee will report all observations of bald eagle activity in the trapping area to the Refuge Manager.
- 14. Every effort will be made to guard against capture of non-target species. All non-target species will be released immediately if possible or turned over to the Refuge Manager on the day taken.

Traps shall be metal traps with smooth jaws only, chain traps and live traps, but shall not include pitfalls, deadfalls, snares, nets or colony traps.

Allowable trap sizes are:

Beaver - Conibear 220-330 (water sets only) Muskrat - Conibear 110 Leghold 1 - 1 1/2

Trapping seasons and quotas are as follows:

Muskrat	Dec. 1 - Jan. 5	80	

<u>Methods of Control and Enforcement</u> - Traps and sets will be inspected on an irregular basis for conformance with State and refuge regulations. Refuge staff may make periodic tours of trap lines with the permittee. Permittees will be required to submit a report to the Refuge Manager no later than ten (10) days after the close of the season documenting (1) the number of days traps were set and the number of traps set each of those days and (2) the number and species trapped each of those days.
