RE: 1981 tern census and inventory data

The number of pairs of Common Terns, after rising slowly for the past two years, headed sharply lower in 1981, declining 1,674 pairs (23%) from 1980 to 5,625 pairs. This was the lowest since 1978, when 4,119+ pairs were recorded. This decline is believed to be principally attributable to the breakup of the Monomoy colony, exascerbated by the virtual absence of vacant habitat elsewhere in the Commonwealth. The Monomoy colony sustained continued habitat loss due mainly to erosion of the island itself and unrelenting pressure from the adjacent Herring and Great Black-backed Gull colony. Although probably not as severe a factor as the foregoing, observers questioned for the first time whether growth and expansion of the Laughing Gull population (embedded within the tern colony), which reached 1,000 pairs in 1981, might not actually be starting to emerge as a negative factor. In addition, Great Horned Owl and Black-crowned Night Heron predation became more severe in 1981, leading to repeated night desertions.

The remaining species declined insignificantly. Least Terns fell to 1,856+ pairs, down from 2,040+ pairs in 1980. Roseate Terns were off about one percent from 1980 to 1,851 pairs. Arctic Terns dropped for the third year in a row, reaching 31 pairs, the same as in 1977.

During the prime census period of June 1-20, Least Terns were known to be breeding at 38 stations compared to 40 in 1980. Common Terns were found at only 18 (v. 23), Roseates at five (v. nine) and Arctics at six (v. seven).

Roseate Terns for the most part abandoned Monomoy Island in 1981 with only 35 pairs remaining (v. 400 pairs in 1980). However, this loss seemed to be mostly balanced-out by increases at Bird Island (up 100 from 1980) and Dead Neck-Sampson's Island (190 pairs v. none in 1980). Ninety-one percent of the Roseate Tern population continued to be dangerously concentrated at the latter two stations with 1,500 and 190 pairs respectively.

The largest concentration of Common Terns was at Monomoy where there were 1,995 pairs recorded (35 percent of the population). Seventy-five percent of the population was concentrated in five colonies larger than 500 pairs. In addition to Monomoy, these were Gray's Beach (860 pairs), Bird Island (600 pairs), Plymouth Beach (550 pairs) and New Island (520 pairs). There were only three Least Tern colonies reported numbering over 100 pairs in 1981 (v. six in 1980), but this included an enormous colony at Nauset Heights, Orleans (415 pairs v. 180 pairs there in 1980). The other two were West Dennis Beach (180 pairs v. 75 in 1980) and Coskata-Coatue (121 pairs v. 89 in 1980).
