#### I. WEEKLY BIRD COUNTS

Weekly bird counts were made from 4 January to 18 August 1980. Twenty-seven counts in all were made. One to six observers completed each count. The standard route from Pumphouse Lake to Main Camp included 14 stops (see illustration 1). Time out for each count was approximately 3 hours. A table of weather conditions is given in table 1.

#### Results

Fourty-eight species comprising 23,820 individuals were counted (see table 2). Not all counts were completed when heavy fog severely limited visibility.

#### II. SPECIES LIST FOR 1980

A total of 60 species were recorded for Amchitka Island during 1980 (see table 3). Observations were made from 1 January to 6 October, 1980, when the field station was closed. All observations were recorded on 3x5" orange cards and filed for future reference.

#### III. SPECIES OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Aleutian Canada geese were first spotted 29 April 1980. Thirty-six birds were observed travelling NW past Kirilof Dock. None of the birds were collared. On 21 May 1980, a wild gander joined the release flock at Main Camp. It was captured, sexed and banded.

Whooper swans were last seen 23 March 1980. Nineteen swans were observed on a small pond approximately 6.4 km from the main propagation facility.

The Emperor geese had returned to Amchitka by 5 October 1980, when 6 were spotted off St. Makarius Point.

Short-eared owls were sighted throughout the season. On 14 April 1980, what appeared to be 2 pairs of owls were sighted immediately beside the fuselage of the wrecked C-47 transport plane by Kirilof Dock. No nests were found.

Other birds which put in a rare appearance this year are recorded in table 4.

Two unusual species were recorded for the first time this year. A documentation for each species sighting is included in this report.

Brown-headed gull (Larus brunnicephalus)

On July 17, 1980 two birds that best fit the description of immature brown-headed gulls were sighted feeding on the beach where Jones Creek flows into Constantine Harbor. They were sighted several days thereafter in the vicinity of Constantine Harbor and Fox Runway.

Long-legged buzzard (Buteo rufinus)

On 22 June 1980, a buteo best fitting the description of a long-legged buzzard was observed on the road near the 13 mile marker. Skies were clear and visibility was exceptionally good at 50 miles. The bird was observed for approximately 15 minutes when a parasitic jaeger harassed it into flying seaward.

<u>Description</u>. As observed by YACC enrollees (Bio-Techs) Patricia Heglund and Beth Wojtowych.

The bird was the size of a Red-tailed hawk. Body was of overall mottled golden coloration. Black eye-stripe, black bill tip, yellow-gold bill. Yellow-gold legs and talons.

(In flight the bird had a buteo tail, unbarred and colored a solid orange/tan. The wings had dark carpals underneath and black wing tips.

The bird was sitting in the road and was almost hit by our truck. It flew to a nearby hummock on the roadside 10 feet away and as we drove up to snap a photo it flew to a road post. As we again approached to photograph, a jaeger flew at it, flushing the bird northeast over the tundra toward the Bering Sea.


