## COOPERATIVE WHOOPING CRANE TRACKING PROJECT (March-May 1985)

Whooping crane migrations are monitored Spring and Fall of each year. Sighting reports are forwarded to the Endangered Species Field Office of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Pierre, South Dakota, by private individuals, Audubon, other organizations, State and Federal Conservation Agencies, and Canadian Wildlife Service and their cooperators in Saskatchewan and adjacent provinces.

Cooperation throughout the whooping crane flyway continues to be excellent. The identification of color-marked birds is providing new information each migration. We can't overemphasize the importance of observers looking closely for the colored leg bands. Since 1977, sixty chicks have been color-marked. Thirty-three color-marked birds were observed at or near Aransas National Wildlife Refuge during the winter of 1984-1985. Additional color-marking is anticipated in 1985.

Whooping crane departures from Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, a sighting report summary, and a map of degree-block sighting locations are included with this narrative resume. Repeat sightings of the same birds at the same location during a stopover period are not included when known to be repeats. Only sightings classified as confirmed, based on whooping crane recovery plan criteria, are shown in the report. Probable and unconfirmed sightings are not shown. All United States reports received are on record in the Pierre Endangered Species Field Office and are available upon request.

It is estimated that 86 cranes completed the fall migration (71 adult/subadult and 15 chicks). One 1982 radioed bird (G-W/R) was found dead on the refuge on November 15, 1984. Another radioed bird, Y-Y/R (1983), has been missing since November 21, 1984, and is presumed dead. The chick which wintered with sandhill cranes northeast of Aransas departed between March 20 and 25. A total of 84 whoopers began the spring migration.

The migration progressed rapidly into Canada with no major storms encountered in the United States. A number of birds were held up briefly in Nebraska by adverse weather and wind over the Easter weekend, allowing for a number of sightings in Nebraska.


Recorded confirmed observations of migrant whooping cranes started April 4, 1985, in the United States and April 22, 1985, in Canada. The last confirmed sighting was on May 4, 1985. Sightings were reported from Saskatachewan, Canada (7); North Dakota (2); Montana (1); Nebraska (7); Kansas (3); and Oklahoma (1). A total of 21 confirmed sightings were recorded.
