

COOPERATIVE WHOOPING CRANE TRACKING PROJECT (September - December 1986)

Whooping crane spring and fall migrations are monitored each year. Sighting reports are forwarded to the Fish and Wildlife Enhancement Office of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Grand Island, Nebraska, by private individuals, Audubon Society, other private organizations, State and Federal conservation agencies, and Canadian Wildlife Service and their cooperators in Saskatchewan and adjacent provinces.

Cooperation throughout the whooping crane flyway continues to be excellent. Special thanks go out to each participant.

Identification of color-marked birds is providing new information each migration. Since 1977, 94 birds have been color-marked and details about the color-marked birds can be found in the fall 1985 migration notice. In 1986, 18 young were color-marked and 17 arrived at Aransas. We cannot overemphasize the importance of observers looking closely for the colored leg bands.

Whooping crane arrivals at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, a sighting report summary, and a map of degree-block sighting locations are included with this narrative summary. Repeat sightings of the same birds at the same location during a stopover period are not included when known to be repeats. Only sightings classified as confirmed, based on whooping crane recovery plan criteria, are shown in the report. Probable and unconfirmed sightings are not shown. All U.S. reports received are on record in the Grand Island Fish and Wildlife Enhancement Office and are available upon request.

Arrivals at Aransas occurred from October 27 through December 31. A total of 109 whoopers (89 adults/subadults and 20 young) were reported at Aransas on December 31, 1986. An additional subadult was confirmed with sandhill cranes in southwestern Oklahoma between December 27, 1986, and January 1, 1987. This crane brings the number of Aransas/Wood Buffalo birds surviving to 110. As of January 20, 1987, this bird had not arrived at Aransas. Ninety-six whoopers departed for the breeding grounds last spring and 21 young were produced during the summer. Under optimum conditions, a total of 117 whoopers were anticipated at Aransas this fall. One adult was found dead on a nest at the breeding grounds last spring. One pair, known to have produced a chick, arrived on their territory at Aransas without the chick. This chick is presumed dead. Twenty young arrived at Aransas, leaving 2 adults and 3 subadults unaccounted for, as could be determined on January 5, 1987.

Recorded confirmed observations of migrant whooping cranes started August 25 in Canada and September 21 in the United States. The last sighting report was on December 27. Sightings were reported from Alberta, Canada (1), Saskatchewan, Canada (4); North Dakota (2); South Dakota (4); Nebraska (6); Kansas (12); Oklahoma (10); and Texas (2). A total of 41 confirmed sightings were recorded.

The fall migration was 1-2 weeks later than normal. The birds moved quickly through Saskatchewan and the Dakotas, resulting in more than 50

percent of the confirmed sightings being reported in Kansas and Oklahoma. Cheyenne Bottoms State Wildlife Area in central Kansas was a popular stopover site, with 26 whoopers confirmed between November 3 and 8.

The Grays Lake whooper which stopped near Hudson, Colorado, (northeast of Denver) during the 1985 fall and 1986 spring migration, was observed in the same area this fall (October 17-26, 1986).


